Dear Congregation



I recently read a C.S. Lewis essay on Christmas. It was quite funny, in a tongue-in-cheek kind of way. Lewis described two different Christmases, one the religious Feast of the Nativity, the other a commercial festival called "Exmas" or "Xmas," honoring the buying of things and giving and receiving of countless gifts and greeting cards. Lewis was a big fan of the first festival, but not so much of the second. He insisted they really were two different things, even if they shared the same name and date on the calendar. Here's an idea of his droll humor on the matter:

"[Here is] a story which puts the contrast between our Feast of the Nativity and all this ghastly 'Xmas' racket at its lowest. My brother heard a woman on a bus say, as the bus passed a church with a crib outside it ... 'They bring religion into everything. Look, they're dragging it even into Christmas now." ...

"Can it really be my duty to buy and receive masses of junk every winter just to help the shopkeepers?" ...

"The pictures which are stamped on the Exmas-cards have nothing to do with the sacred story which the priests tell about Crissmas." *

Lewis wrote these things over fifty years ago. We might wince at his curmudgeonly humor, but sadly, the way many moderns treat Christmas proves they are not celebrating the Nativity, even less so now than when Lewis wrote. Many won't even wish you 'Merry Christmas' anymore, but resort to the rather insipid 'Happy Holidays,' or call it the "Winter Festival," to be inclusive of other religious and ethnic festivals. The music, TV shows, and entertainment accompanying the secular holiday often have nothing to remind us of the Nativity. "Baby its cold outside," "All I want for Christmas is you," "Frosty," and "Krampus," are just some of the more obviously pagan substitutes for celebrating the glory of God made flesh.

The non-believing world does not celebrate the birth of our Lord. But they want something like it, the joy and fulfillment it promises. I think this may be one reason for the increase of depression this time of year, as well as the efforts to create some of those substitute holidays. It's not just that there is less sunlight. It's that there is less hope. There is a lingering cultural memory of the original Holy Day. The bright lights and decorations and gift giving whisper to them they should be happy, but they do not have the same comfort and hope which belongs to those who know Jesus. The burden of their disappointments, heartaches, and losses – and yes, their sins – weighs them down. One can try to cover that up with feasting and romance, but it is still there, beneath the surface, yearning for an answer.

Such yearning can prepare the way, making hearts receptive to the One who is our Peace. So, all is not lost! Even in Xmas, there are still echoes of Christmas. Some of those greeting cards circulating at this time of year still declare the timeless truth: "Wise Men seek Him still." Santa Clause is still the echo of blessed St. Nicholas, beloved gift-giving bishop of Myra and friend of the poor. We Christians can give gifts remembering the generosity of God, who in love gave his only begotten Son. Our family gatherings and reunions can remind us of God's grace incarnate in Christ that makes love, reconciliation, and peace possible. We can invite our non-Christian friends to our homes and to experience the joy of worship in church. We can share a meal with them, share a Bible or Christmas devotional with them, lift their vision to something higher, something truer.

So, I invite you to observe the Feast of the Nativity as the heart of your Christmas this year. Don't let the pagan substitutes bother you. Remember that "the Son of God became a man to enable men to become sons of God!" (Lewis, *Mere Christianity*). Love him with your whole heart, and let others see Him in you as a light that draws them to His hope. And have a very Merry Christmas and a blessed New Year!

Faith Community Nurse's Notes

Where to Go for Care

Are you having a health issue? Did you call your primary care provider? Should you go to an Urgent Care or the Emergency Room? There seems to be a lot of confusion regarding the appropriate place to go for health care. The correct answer hinges on the type of health issue that you are having.

Primary Care Providers are best for health maintenance issues and preventative care. They should manage any chronic conditions and medication used to control those conditions (high blood pressure, anxiety, diabetes, heart conditions etc.). A provider that is knowledgeable about your past history and has an established health professional/patient relationship is a valuable asset in coordinating services with other health care specialists should the need arise. They also track immunizations and provide education and counseling. It is usually wise to give them a call first when not feeling well.

The Emergency Room is the most obvious choice for any life threatening problems! Call 911 when necessary. It is wise to go to the Emergency Room with any of the following:

- Chest pain not related to a cough
- Any loss of consciousness
- Stroke symptoms such as weakness in an extremity, altered speech, visual disturbance, facial droop, mental confusion
- Symptoms of a heart attack such as chest pain or pressure, pain between shoulder blades or radiating pain down one of the arms, dizziness, clammy skin, vomiting, shortness of breath
- Palpitations or rapid heart beat
- Severe shortness of breath
- Seizure activity
- Head injuries (CT scans usually needed)
- Abdominal pain not related to diarrhea
- Broken bones involving open skin
- Severe allergic reaction



- Poisoning
- Wounds that are gaping or spurting blood
- Pregnancy related problems
- Persons exhibiting suicidal thoughts
- Severe flank pain (possible kidney stone)

Urgent Care facilities are useful in treating folks with minor injuries and illnesses. It is important to know that not all Urgent Care facilities are alike. Some provide more in depth care than others. Most only provide basic x-ray and do not do lab work which requires follow up. They are designed to provide care to ambulatory patients with a treat and street type system. Point of care testing is limited to urine dips, urine STD testing, strep screening, symptomatic Covid and flu testing. The Physician or Health Care Provider may not be at all acquainted with you so make sure if you go to this type of facility that you take a list of current medications, allergies and past medical history. Computer records are NOT all interlinked and this information is vital to providing safe, efficient, care. Patients like to be seen in a timely manner and this is hard to accomplish without proper information. Health issues that can usually be managed at an urgent care facility are:

- Rashes (like poison ivy)
- Seasonal allergy issues
- Sinus infections
- Cold or flu like symptoms
- Ear pain
- Eye redness or irritation
- Sore throat
- Upper respiratory infections
- Urinary tract infections
- Minor allergic reactions
- Minor strains and sprains
- · Minor fractures of toes, hand, wrist, arm, lower leg, ankle or foot
- Minor lacerations


When children look at snow, they see individual snowflakes that are all uniquely made, but can make a big impact on the world when they stick together.

Likewise, we are made in the image of God and are unique.

As the church, we are the body of Christ and are called to work

together to accomplish the work of the church.

How can your family share their unique gifts with the church?



The word legacy refers to anything that is handed down from the past. It can be property, money, good looks, talents —even behaviors such as disciplined routines or bad habits. The ones that come before us, leave behind good things and bad, right things and wrong. They are remembered for something that outlasts them. When it comes to parenting, the thought of leaving a legacy is somewhat terrifying for me!

As I write this, I'm in the thick of parenting three teenagers, and quite frankly I shudder when I think of how they might describe my potential legacy. If you asked them what they will remember me for, they might say something like, "She was constantly nagging us to unload the dishwasher, feed the dog,

fold the laundry, get off our phones..." and while all of that is true, I want them to remember more than anything that I cared about their heart -- more specifically, their heart for God and His Word.

I suspect many Christian parents feel the same way--that we want our kids to know Jesus and walk with Him, living out His Word in faith. So, how do we know we're doing everything we can to make that our end goal? How do we leave a legacy of discipleship?

We can hope and pray fervently that our kids have a lasting faith, but those things by themselves won't get us there. It takes a commitment to daily discipleship, a resolve to teach them biblical truth as you go through the hours, days, and years of their childhood and youth.

The familiar passage in Deuteronomy 6 tells us to teach our children biblical truth when they are at home, on the road, lying down, and rising up-- basically, all the time. While that may sound overwhelming, it's really simple because it boils down to this: tell your kids about God as you live your daily life.

According to the *Nothing Less* study by Lifeway Research, reading the Bible is by far the number one thing parents can do to help their children continue to grow in their faith as adults. While this should be big no surprise, it's important to ask ourselves, "Are we really doing this?"

If we want to leave a legacy of discipleship, we must prioritize God's word. Bible reading can begin at a very young age when we read Bible stories to children while showing them the bright and beautiful pictures that go along. As they grow older, we can read a full text Bible with them, modeling how to have a devotion. Certainly, they should see us reading on our own bibles because most of our parenting is "caught" not taught. Instead of having your quiet time hidden away, commit to having it out in the open--where your children can see you!

Pointing out biblical truth in everyday life was one of the factors that rose to the top of the things parents can do to disciple their children most effectively (*Nothing Less study 2016*). this works at every age and stage of childhood--babies, toddlers, preschoolers, preteens, and teenagers can all learn from us as we point out little things that connect to God.

For example, we can tell younger kids that God made the trees they see in the park. We can tell older kids that we serve a creative God when we see the trees in the park period time biblical truth to memorable things helps build foundations that lead to a lasting faith. There are countless examples of how to do this. We only need to ask God to make them obvious to us!'

The study also found that prayers and effective factor, as well as serving together. If you want to leave a legacy of serving, get started now, so your children will serve long after you. Find ways for your children to serve alongside you: at church, in the neighborhood, at school, or anywhere in the community.

Listening to Christian music also has a positive effect on children and can be used as a discipleship tool. Scripture-filled lyrics rooted in sound doctrine really point back to God's Word--it's just singing instead! Find some fun Bible memory songs for younger children and then age up to worship songs. Consider singing together as a family.

Through Bible reading, prayer, serving, and listening to music together, we can leave a legacy of discipleship. These are the everyday habits and practices that lead to kids growing into spiritually healthy adults where they too will disciple others-repeating the legacy again and again.







7 Things that Will Keep Me from Coming Back to Your Church Cara Meredith Published:Oct 09, 2021



We didn't find ourselves church shopping as much as usual this time around – "we," being my husband and our two young sons. "This time around," being another unexpected move, this time from Northern California to the Pacific Northwest.

Instead, we did our homework ahead of time. We connected with church leaders over e-mail and Twitter; we pored over their websites in order to find the best fit for our little family.

But it hasn't been that easy every other time we've moved and had to switch churches.

I'm guessing we're not alone in visiting a new church for the first time. Whether you attend the congregation you grew up in, or just celebrated your three-month anniversary in a faith community, I guarantee there are people among you, visiting your church for the first time. And, no matter how long or how involved you find yourself with the body of Christ, it's easy *not* to see the visitors among you.

It's also easy for those visitors, just like my family and me, to then be turned away from the church.

Curious as to what turns a new person away? I've got seven ideas for you.

1. Refuse to see me.

It's easy to spot visitors: we don't know where we're going, because we don't know what we're doing in this new environment. Whether you're a greeter or the person sitting two seats to my right, I need you to see me – because isn't seeing half the battle?

2. Don't offer me a smile.

Now here's the deal: we're Jesus people. We're supposed to be filled with his light, his joy, his love – because *this* is how the Spirit of God has changed us. But I can't tell you how many times I've visited a new church and not received a single smile. So, be brave, meet my hopeful gaze, and give me a genuine grin, will you?

3. Neglect offering me help.

It's easy, when we know the routines and the rhythms and the know-hows of a place, to forget that not everyone knows what we know. Chances are, if it looks like I might not know what I'm doing, I really *don't* know what I'm doing. So, offer to help me. I'll be so grateful to you.

4. Abstain from introducing yourself to me.

Sometimes we think the business of getting to know newcomers belongs to the staff of a church – but that can't be further from the truth. As the body of Christ, we're the fleshy arms and legs of Jesus, and just as Christ calls us to be the Church, the staff of your church needs you to notice new people like me.

5. Forget that I'm a person who wants to be known, just like you.

It always amazes me how much I can learn about a person in less than a minute's time. That being said, because we humans were and are made for genuine relationship, there's something about another person wanting to really *know* me that makes me feel known and understand. So, ask me where I'm from. Connect the dots. Practice active listen so you can ask me *another* question. I guarantee it'll make someone like me feel loved!

6. Ignore my boundaries.

In one breath, I write about getting to know me, but in the next breath, I also ask you to respect my boundaries. If I'm an introverted or private person, I may not want to answer your questions – so be okay with and respect my boundaries if I choose not to flow with you in conversation. Don't take it personally!

7. Forget my name.

Here's the deal: we, as parishioners, oftentimes sit in the same area in a church service. Visitors, who might still be *visiting* four weeks in, oftentimes sit in the same area in a church service as well. Whether I see you afterwards the church foyer, or the next week while sitting behind you again, I'll probably remember you, because, to me, you're one of the few representatives of this place. So, remember me. Write down my name on the inside of your Bible or in your cell phone. Build up this name-remembering muscle.

The list could continue on forever. If you're an usher, don't seat me in the front row. If I choose to keep my newborn or my children with me, because one of us isn't comfortable in the children's program, don't glare at me if they act like children – Jesus *loves* the little children, just as much as you and me.

But here's the bottom line: we really *can* be good neighbors to those who are visiting our churches for the first time. We can emulate the actions and compassion of Jesus who welcomed every sinner and saint into his midst. We can take note of the Good Samaritan who noticed the stranger, the one every other passerby ignored and walked right on past.

And maybe in doing this, we'll prevent some new visitors from church shopping – because we'll have appropriately welcomed them into Christ's space.

"What's in a name? That which we call a rose by any other name would smell just as sweet."

William Shakespeare uses this line in his play Romeo and Juliet to convey that what something is called is irrelevant. If that is true, why do corporations spend time and money to research, test market, and advertise a new name?

We have all experienced name changes during our lifetime. Banks, by merger or consolidation, change names frequently. Our local hospitals have recently gone through a number of name changes. Streets, roads, and highways are being renamed to honor someone or something noteworthy. We are now facing a major change for our congregation: the renaming of our church.

Our church is no stranger to name change. At its founding in 1902, we were known as the First Methodist Episcopal Church. 1968 brought about a name change to First United Methodist Church of Schuylkill Haven. Now, as the process of disaffiliation from the United Methodist Church is gradually moving forward, we are preparing for the time when our congregation is no longer part of that denomination. A renaming committee has formed to begin the work of selecting a new church name. Acknowledging the quote from William Shakespeare, we will be the same congregation of Bible-believing, God-fearing, and community-serving members we have always been, carrying out the mission and the work that our Almighty God has set before us, but with a new name appropriate to our new situation.

The committee believes that this task should involve the input of all church members, allowing each of them to submit up to two (2) names for consideration. A formal letter will be sent out early in 2023 explaining the process. The submitted names will then be reviewed. It is important to note that this is not a contest. The committee is relying on the wisdom and direction of the Holy Spirit to bring us our new church name.

Once they have been compiled, the committee will reduce the list of names by eliminating duplicates and those that, for legal reasons, cannot be used. The renaming committee will then move on to the next phase.

We humbly ask for your prayerful support in this very important task.
