News about the Global Methodist Church

Dear Congregation,

Here is some helpful information about the new and rapidly growing Global Methodist Church. This is a good time to get informed about the GMC, as it is our hoped-for destination for our future denominational affiliation.



Since officially launching on May 1, 2022, the denomination has grown to about 5000 churches worldwide, with approximately 5-6 million members, led by about 5700 clergy, making it a medium size denomination by US standards. The GMC is a global movement, with churches in about 30 different countries, with six different 'official' languages: English, Spanish, Portuguese, Kiswahili, Korean, and French. It is governed by the *Book of Doctrines and Discipline of the Global Methodist Church (2024)*. See: https://globalmethodist.org/books-of-doctrines-and-discipline/. The latest annual conference to join is in Zimbabwe, Africa.

The GMC is committed to the final authority of Scripture and the Lordship of Jesus Christ, to classic orthodox Christianity, Wesleyan theological distinctives, and traditional Christian moral values rooted in scriptural holiness. Its mission: "The Global Methodist Church exists to make disciples of Jesus Christ and spread scriptural holiness across the globe." Its Vision: "Through the empowerment of the Holy Spirit, the Global Methodist Church envisions multiplying disciples of Jesus Christ throughout the earth who flourish in scriptural holiness as we worship passionately, love extravagantly, and witness boldly."

Presently, there are 23 Annual Conferences in the United States. The movement is made up mostly of small churches. Almost all of these are former UMC churches, and many have experienced dramatic revival and growth since joining the GMC. The Northeast Annual Conference includes Maine, New Hampshire, Vermont, Massachusetts, Rhode Island, Connecticut, New York, New Jersey, the eastern 2/3s of Pennsylvania, Maryland, northern West Virginia, and the District of Columbia. This annual conference has about 187 churches, the largest of which has about 500 in weekly worship.

Eight bishops oversee the denomination, with 2 formerly UMC emeritus bishops, and 6 new bishops elected at the September 2024 Convening General Conference in San Jose, Costa Rica. Bishops have defined term limits and generally return to local church ministry when their term expires.

Bishops oversee doctrinal integrity, are responsible to teach the doctrines and discipline of the church and are involved in appointing and ordaining pastors. They travel widely and each is responsible for anywhere from 3 to 9 annual conferences. Each annual conference is overseen by a conference superintendent, who lives in the conference and oversees the temporal and business affairs of that conference. Within each annual conference, a volunteer supervising elder (ordained pastor) gives local oversight to groups of 10 to 12 churches, organized by geographic area.

Local congregations are at the heart of the movement. The purpose and mission of each local church is to make disciples of Jesus Christ. There is no 'trust clause' tying member churches to the denomination. Instead, it is a voluntary association. Churches own their own property.

The system for pastoral appointments is a hybrid model. There is no longer a yearly appointment covenant, but clergy can be moved and appointed at any time of year, whenever they or the local church see the need (with due notice of change). When a new pastor is requested, the bishop will present several candidates, giving the local church time to interview each one, listen to them preach, and rank them in order of preference. Candidates may interview at several churches, and choose a different church as their first choice, so the local church might get its second choice, and so on.

Apportionments, otherwise known as 'connectional funding,' are the local church's share of denominational expenses. The denomination is intentionally organized to be 'lean' at the top, so that most money stays in the local church. Currently, apportionments are 3% of general fund *giving*, not counting capital funds and benevolence receipts. 2% goes to the annual conference and 1% goes to the global administrative offices for their expenses. For example, a church with \$500K in unrestricted general fund income would pay \$15,000 for its total apportionments.

The next official session of the GMC General Conference will take place in Africa, in 2026. Delegates will begin to be elected at

this May's annual conferences. You can find extensive additional information at the GMC website: https://globalmethodist.org/.

The Discipleship Council will be recommending further study of the GMC for our next church-wide small group experience. We are thinking about recommending *A Catechism of the Christian Faith and Doctrine for the Global Methodist Church* (Seedbed, 2023), which summarizes the doctrines of the GMC. Please keep the church and both the UMC and the GMC in your prayers.

What's Happening in the Lawsuit **April Update**

The Montgomery County judge in the case has certified the lawsuit for a jury trial. The Eastern PA Conference filed a request in February 2025 asking the judge to reconsider, which he denied. It is anticipated that the Conference will file one more motion asking for reconsideration. Assuming this also is denied, a jury trial is likely to be scheduled sometime in the Fall. There is a possibility the Conference might become open to a negotiated settlement, but there are no guarantees. It is hoped the Conference will at least consider it at this year's Annual Conference in mid-May.

What should we be doing in the meantime? Keep doing the work of God's kingdom! Live as faithful disciples, share the good news with those who are open, worship fervently, and do the good works God has prepared for you. Pray for our lawyers and for those who oppose us. Ask the Lord for a favorable outcome.

5 Ways to Include Jesus in Your Summer Janet Denison

No early morning alarms, carpool lanes, and homework projects. The unscheduled—or less scheduled—days of summer have begun!

You and your kids will enjoy the summer days ahead. Even for those who work outside the home, summer life is usually slower, and vacations are ahead. Plan to enjoy the great gift of family this summer!

These months offer some opportunities to help your children spiritually as well. They might not be in a classroom, listening to teachers—but they are listening.

How can you help them hear a lot and experience a lot of Jesus this summer?

1. Invite Jesus into your day and expect him to come.

Every day can start with a prayer, with all the kids or one-on-one, that includes their requests for the day and thoughts of others. But a *very* important part of those prayers is watching to see how they are answered. Those answers will prompt some great "Jesus" conversations this summer.

2. Fill your home and car with Christian music.

There is so much to learn about Christ and experience through music. Tune your television and your radio to music that glorifies the Lord. Your kids will learn a lot from the lyrics and hopefully sing some of those thoughts and words *to* Jesus.

3. Help your kids serve Jesus and others.

They can read books about Jesus to younger kids and answer their questions. They can help with a VBS or at a mission. They can shop with you for others, mow an elderly person's lawn, or, for someone who's not able, walk their dog. If you pray for a chance to serve, Jesus will answer that prayer, and your kids will learn the sacrifice and blessing of helping others.

4. Develop Jesus habits.

You probably spend more time with your kids during their days in June, July, and August. It's a good time to work on the basics. A lot of "good" manners are also "God" matters. Connect the two.

- Running ahead to hold the door for the mom with the baby carrier or stroller.
- Reaching things from the shelf at the grocery store for the person in the motorized cart.
- Noticing the person in line who needs to go first.
- Responding to others with respect, even when that same respect has not been returned.
- Handing a water bottle or fast-food voucher to the person with the cardboard sign.

I'm sure you can think of more!

Family habits can become Jesus habits. Just connect the behavior with the One you are really serving.

5. Finally, Mom and Dad, simplify and set apart your summer for Christ.

We all want our kids to walk with and serve Jesus. Truthfully, the most important way to invite Jesus into your kids' summer is to invite him into yours. If your kids see you find joy in Jesus, serve Jesus, study and speak to Jesus, chances are, they will too. Faith and spirituality will be caught, as much as taught. If your kids know you *need* Jesus, they will likely realize they do too. Psalm 16:11 says, "You make known to me the path of life; in your

Skin Care

Spring is in full swing now. The sun is up longer, the weather is warmer and opportunities to be outdoors have increased. It is a good time to discuss proper care of the skin.

Our skin is the largest organ of the body. It consists of three layers which work together to perform vital body functions. The outermost layer is the epidermis which acts as a barrier protecting the body from pathogens and the environment. The next layer is known as the dermis and contains blood vessels, hair follicles, sweat glands and sensory receptors. The deepest layer of skin is the hypodermis also known as subcutis or subcutaneous layer. It is made of fat (adipose tissue) which provides insulation to the body and cushions deeper tissue. It also anchors the skin to the underlying structures. The three major functions of the skin as a whole are protection, thermoregulation and sensation.

Your skin takes care of you, it is important that you take care of it. Good skin care includes sun protection, cleansing and moisturizing. The use of a broad-spectrum sunscreen with an SPF of at least 30 is a daily necessity. It should be reapplied every two hours or more if sweating or swimming. Sun damage is the leading cause of premature aging of the skin and skin cancer. The sun is strongest at noon but is best avoided between the hours of 10AM and 4PM. If being outside during that time is unavoidable, seek shade and wear protective clothing including a wide-brimmed hat.

Cleanse your skin twice a day with a gentle cleanser. In the morning, it removes any overnight dirt or oil. In the evening you need to remove makeup, dirt and any other substances that may come into contact with your skin. Avoid scrubs or harsh soaps which may strip your skin of natural oils. Use warm water, not hot water which can dry out skin. After washing, pat your skin

dry, do not rub. This allows some moisture to remain on the skin. Shaving is recommended after washing when the skin is moist. Protect the skin by using shaving cream, lotion, or gel. Use a clean, sharp raiser and shave in the direction of hair growth. Be sure to rinse the razor between each stroke.

Moisturize your skin after bathing. Be sure to use the type of moisturizer that is best for your skin type, whether it be, dry, normal, or oily. Moisturizing after a bath helps to lock in hydration, maintaining the skin's natural barrier, protecting it from damage and irritation. It also softens the skin and reduces the appearance of fi ne lines.

Do self checks on your skin. Examine your skin regularly for any suspicious looking moles or new lesions. Any new skin growths which are tender, scaly, itchy, or bleeding should be brought to the attention of a doctor. Detecting skin cancer at its earliest stage improves treatment.
